D'var Torah: To Speak Or Not To Speak?

There is a fascinating idea expressed by the holy mystics of Kabbalah that the twelve months of the year correspond to the twelve tribes of the Jewish People. There is a difference of opinion exactly which months correspond to which tribe, but many authorities use the order of formation of the tribes as they traveled for forty years through the Sinai desert. As such, the month of Nissan, the first of the year, corresponds to the tribe of Yehudah - the tribe that represents Kingship and Royalty. According to this calculation, the month of Kislev - the month in which we celebrate the holiday of Chanukah - corresponds to the tribe of Binyomin. As the mystics teach, each month's tribe has a special quality or trait that we are to focus on and learn to incorporate into ourselves during that month. So, what is the unique trait of Binyomin and what connection does it have with Chanukah which occurs during its month?

Our Sages tell us that Rachel, the mother of Binyomin, excelled, among other things, in her ability to control her mouth. Despite knowing full well that her father Lavan would try to trick Yaakov and therefore devising a secret code that she and Yaakov shared to ensure that it was Rachel under the chuppah, she kept her mouth shut when she gave that code to her sister Leah. (Yes, this requires further discussion as to why she did this without telling Yaakov, so perhaps we can address that question in another D'var Torah.) Nevertheless, Rachel exhibited a tremendous amount of self-control over her mouth

despite the negative ramifications it had for her well-being. Our Sages teach that she bequeathed this trait to her descendants as well. For example, even after the prophet Shmuel anointed Shaul as the first king over Israel, Shaul (from the tribe of Binyomin) didn't tell people about his appointment until after Shmuel announced it to the nation. Additionally, despite people questioning his credentials as king and verbally assaulting him, Shaul remained silent. His ability to control his mouth was exemplary.

Similarly, we find this trait of keeping quiet in the face of pressures to speak out with another descendant of Rachel/Binyomin -Queen Esther. We are all familiar with the storyline of Purim in which Esther is chosen as the new queen for Achashveirosh yet, despite numerous attempts to find out her lineage,

Esther remains silent. It is only after Mordechai tells her that the time is ripe, does she reveal her Jewish roots and that Haman's plan to annihilate her people must be stopped. It is this quality of control over her mouth, knowing when to speak and, more importantly, when NOT to speak, that runs through the generations of descendants of Rachel/Binyomin.

Finally, we find this trait of keeping silent with Binyomin himself. The Midrash states that somehow Binyomin became aware of what actually happened with the sale of Yoseph by his brothers and his subsequent departure down to Egypt. In fact, the mystics point out that the name of the precious stone on the Choshen (Breastplate), worn by the Kohen Gadol, representing Binyomin was called

"Yoshpeh." Rabbenu Bachya explains that this stone was comprised of various shades of red, black, green and purple and it was used as a segula to stop bleeding. It was granted to Binyomin since his heart went through various changes, as he was unsure whether or not to reveal to his father the truth of what he had learned of Yoseph's whereabouts. Binyomin was not present when Yoseph was sold, but according to Rabbenu Bachya, Binyomin knew the brothers sold Yoseph and he grappled with whether or not to reveal this secret. The name symbolizes the fact that יש פה (yesh peh - he has a mouth), but decided to remain silent for the benefit of the family dynamic.

If Binyomin's strength was that he remained silent, then why is the stone not called אין פה (ain peh - no mouth), since he withheld his words? The Chidushe Harim explains that when one is in control of an object, he is considered the owner of that object. If one cannot do what he desires with an object, then obviously he is not the master of that item. When one cannot control his speech and blurts out inappropriate language or speech, then it is as if he is not the owner of his mouth. Only one who is able to regulate his speech is in full control of his mouth. That is why the stone is referred to as "yesh peh" since Binyomin was able to exercise restraint, thereby exhibiting full ownership over his Continued on Page 3

Adult Ed Classes



Perhaps, then, this is the connection between the month of Kislev, the tribe of Binyomin, and the holiday of Chanukah. Let us learn from the tribe of Binyamin to be extremely careful with our speech. To consider what we say, how we say it, and when we say it. To always be in control of what comes out of our mouths – so that we remain the master of our speech. If we are successful in becoming this master of speech, we will merit to utilize this power in its most glorious fashion by singing Hallel and Thanksgiving (הלל והודאה) which is the hallmark of Chanukah.






















Camp Shoresh 2022
